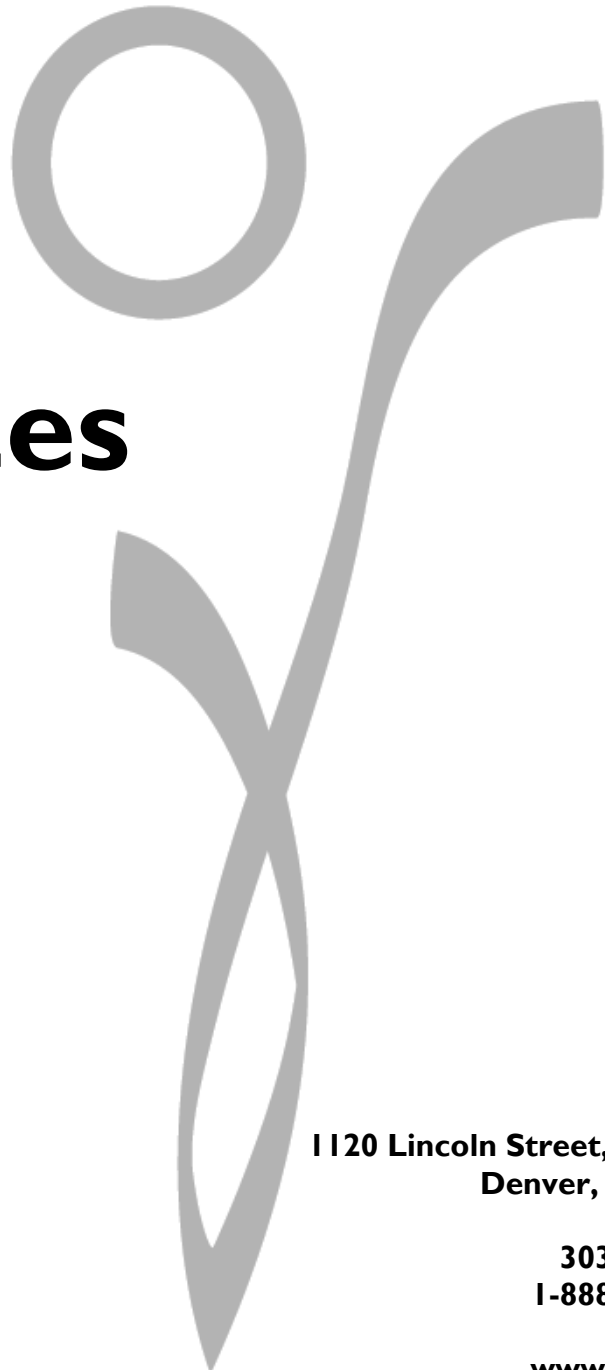

Books

A Shelter is Not a Home or Is It?

Ralph da Costa Nunez, 2004

Ralph Nunez tells the story for the first time of the evolution of homelessness in New York City over the past twenty years. Nunez explains how homelessness has become almost a disease for children of poor, young families. With the cities facing a crisis in affordable housing and the number of homeless families approaching record highs, nation wide, policy makers and the public must take a long, hard look at the failed policies addressing homelessness.

A Private Family Matter

Victor Rivas Rivers, 2005

The Cuban-born author begins this memoir by recalling when he was kidnapped, along with three of his siblings, by his own father, who abandoned Victor's pregnant mother and took the children on a cross-country hell-ride that nearly ended in a fatal collision. This journey of survival portrays how, instead of becoming a madman like his father, Victor was saved by families, teachers, coaches, to empower him on his road from gang member to class president, and his football adventures at Florida State and with the Miami Dolphins, to overcome the Hollywood odds and becoming a champion for all those impacted by domestic violence.

A Vindication of the Rights of Women

Mary Wollstonecraft, 1996

Wollstonecraft argues that middle-class women's oppression is largely due to their deficient education. Men possessed no innate intellectual superiority over women, she insisted; the most critical difference between the sexes is the way they are taught. Such an education, Wollstonecraft argues is that reason and passion are mutually exclusive; indeed, her own emotions are a powerful rhetorical device.

Aids Health Services at the Crossroads: Lessons for Community Care

Victoria Weisfeld, 1991

This book tells the story of nine projects in 11 cities across the United States and how they have tried to meet the challenge of AIDS. This information demonstrates that at least in 11 US cities, the complexity has often yielded to creativity and zeal, and new collective strength has been achieved through cooperation and determination. These examples will provide important insight and guidance for other communities that will face similar challenges.

The Battered Woman and Shelters: The Social Construction of Wife Abuse

Donileen R. Loseke, 1947

The book focuses on the practical dilemmas and circumstances faced by shelter workers in fulfilling their professional obligations. What Loseke offers is a vision of battered women and shelter workers as human beings and practical actors who use available cultural resources to understand and manage the troubles of everyday life.

Battered Women, Children, and Welfare Reform: The Ties That Bind

Ruth Brandwein, Editor 1999

Ruth Brandwein has brought together a series of essays that analyze the intersection between domestic violence against women, poverty, and welfare cutbacks. Together the essays make clear that while poverty contributes to abuse, so does abuse perpetuate poverty. The edited book links two timely topics – domestic violence and welfare reform.

The Batterer as Parent: Addressing the Impact of Domestic Violence on Family Dynamics

Lundy Bancroft & Jay Silverman, 2002

Bancroft and Silverman have deepened the readers understanding of the trauma to children of battered women. They turn the spotlight onto the attitudes and behaviors of batterers as parents, examining in concrete and illuminating detail the home conditions that domestic violence creates...

Beyond Beijing: The International Women's Movement Handbook

Edited by Cheryl Miller with Salome Chasnoff, 1997

The documentary handbook produced by women about the largest meeting of women in world history, the Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) Forum on Women in Huairou, China, in September 1995. There, over 30,000 activists convened to communicate, collaborate, celebrate, and influence the outcome of the parallel United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing.

(This book also includes an abridged Platform for Action, an appendix for teachers and an extensive resource list.)

Beyond the Shelter Wall: Homeless Families Speak Out

Ralph da Costa Nuñez with Naomi Sugie, 2004

Beyond the Shelter Wall gives readers a rare look at the other side of homelessness, the side that goes beyond a single need for housing. Whether it is the story of Rose, a twenty-one year old mother of five, Anita, a product of over twenty foster homes and mental institutions, or Denise, a recovering addict, these mothers describe the confusion, challenges, and desperation that brought them to the shelter system. At a time when family homelessness has reached an all-time high, these first-hand accounts provide insight and clarity into the growing epidemic of America's poorest.

Black and Blue

Anna Quindlen, 1998

In the novel *Black and Blue* Fran Benedetto tells a spellbinding story: how at nineteen she fell in love and how this passionate marriage became a nightmare, why she stayed, and what happened on the night she finally decided to run away with her ten-year-old son and start a new life under a new name. As Fran starts to heal from the pain of the past, she almost believes she has escaped it – that he will not find her and again provoke the complex attraction between them one of attraction and destruction, lust and love.

Broken

Gin Dagger, 2005

Gin Dagger began as a young girl in rebellion against her strict pastor father. She then graduated into a world of sin. The result was a broken woman, bent on a self-destructive lifestyle spiraling downward and running from each and every conflict. One day her stubborn will was broken – her life transformed. She is now involved in women's ministries helping battered and abused women.

Change of Heart: The Bodhisattva Peace Training of Chagdud Tulka

Edited by Lama Shenpen Drolma, 2003

Chagdud was an outstanding Buddhist master. In *Change of Heart* he hands us an extraordinary gift – a wise and gentle guide to the compassionate path of the bodhisattvas. Confronting directly the dilemmas and uncertainty facing people today, he shows how anyone can follow the training and use its methods to discover inner peace, reduce suffering, deal with violence and aggression, awaken the good heart, and so live in the world in such a way as to benefit all those around them.

Child Abuse, Domestic Violence, and Animal Abuse: Linking the Circles of Compassion for Prevention and Intervention

Edited by Frank Ascione and Phil Arkow, 1999

This book provides an ongoing effort to reacquaint professionals engaged in the prevention of animal abuse, child abuse, and domestic violence with a common denominator. Acts of aggression against any member of a family endanger all in the household and put others in the community at risk as well. Only recently have researchers begun to take a serious look at the long-term impacts of animal abuse perpetrated by or witnessed by children.

Church & Society: Claiming the Violence Among and Within Us

Sara Pottschmidt Lisherness, 1995

The issue of *Church & Society* is an effort to help the church look at violence, to help people of faith recognize that violence is not "out there" but right in our midst and that individuals, families, the church, and all of society contribute to its growth – and are affected by it.

Class Action: Landmark Case that Changed Sexual Harassment Law

Clara Bingham & Laura Leedy Gansler, 2002

In northern Minnesota, a group of women endured a shocking degree of sexual harassment until one of them stepped forward and sued the company that had turned a blind eye to their plea for help. *Jenson v. Eveleth Mines*, the first sexual harassment class action in America, permanently changed the legal landscape as well as the lives of the women who fought the battle.

Colorado Nonprofit Management: Understanding the Legal Issues

Marjorie J. Long, Esq. & Elise Burton, Esq., 2004

Nonprofits are governed by many local ordinances, state and federal statutes, administrative agency regulations, and a growing number of court decisions. Understanding the sources of law and the organization's responsibilities under the law helps to minimize a nonprofit's risk of fines, penalties, excise taxes, loss of tax-exempt status, and substantial litigation costs.

Codependency Sucks

Linda Meyerholz, M.S., 1995

Codependency is the attachment of a codependent person to another person, group, gang, cult, cause, profession, job, addition or thing(s). The codependent hopes to: be taken care of, find an identity, be fulfilled, completed or released from emotional/psychic pain through the new attachment. We can change everything and anything about ourselves we choose to. Our greatest hopes and dreams can come true. We know how to do that today. And that's what this book is all about.

Current Controversies on Family Violence

Richard Gelles & Donileen Loseke, 1997

This volume is about some of the most important and most hotly debated issues surrounding family violence. Clearly, its organization differs from that of most mass-media treatment of social problems. In this volume, the authors introduce three frameworks for family violence: psychological perspective, sociological approach and the feminist view. Such conceptual frameworks are of crucial importance because they answer the most fundamental questions about social problems such as family violence: What type of a problem are we dealing with? What behaviors are of concern? Who is involved? What is the relationship between victims and offenders? These questions are asked and answered from different perspectives throughout the volume.

Ditch That Jerk: Dealing with Men Who Control and Hurt Women

Pamela Jayne, M.A., 2004

The material in *Ditch That Jerk* is intended to help women dealing with abusive relationships. It is the intent of Pamela to provide accurate and dependable information, and the content of the book was compiled in consultation with other professionals. The ideas and suggestions in the book are not intended to replace professional advice.

Domestic Partner Abuse

L. Kevin Hamberger, PhD & Claire Renzetti, PhD, 1996

The editors and contributors expand the models of abusive relationships to include the special concerns of gay and lesbian couples, mutually violent partners, abusive women, and others. This book sheds new light on a complex social problem.

The Domestic Violence Source Book

Dawn Bradley Berry, J.D., 2000

Dedicated people are working to change attitudes, provide services, and hold abusers accountable. Through their efforts, things are changing – but we still have a long way to go. If educated professionals still ask, "Why doesn't she leave?" then there is a great deal of education yet to be done. It is the hope of Dawn Bradley Berry that those involved in any way with the crisis of family violence, victims, friends, professionals, and others who care about stopping the cycle of violence, will find the information in the book to be helpful and illuminating.

Domestic Violence: The Criminal Justice Response

Eve S. Buzawa & Carl G. Buzawa 1996

This book will provide a brief overview of theories of causation of domestic violence and its prevalence in our society. Concentration is placed, however, on the rapidly evolving nature of the criminal justice system response to this problem and the opportunities and limitations of various new approaches being attempted.

Domestic Violence: What Every Pastor Needs to Know

Reverend AL Miles, 2000

Al Miles captures the spiritual heart of the battered woman who is victimized by her partner. This book is mandatory reading for every spiritual and religious leader who wants to help victims and perpetrators heal. Pointing out the barriers to ministering to this group, Re. Miles makes it clear that it is the responsibility of religious leaders to educate themselves so they can help their parishioners. This book tells them how to do it.

Endangered: Your Child in a Hostile World

Johann Christoph Arnold

Arnold concedes that bringing up children in the 21st century is going to demand everything of us. But he insists that as long as we raise children with the reverence that lets them know they count, we will win their confidence and their trust...

End the Pain: Solutions for Stopping Domestic Violence

Lynn Hawker, PhD & Terry Bicehouse, 1995

According to Hawker & Bicehouse, one of the real strengths of this book is making abused women and abusive men come alive as individuals, not stereotypes, at different points on the continuum of abuse. The editors have developed a useful differentiation of stages of abuse describing the controller, the abuser, and the batterer. Discovering these levels will be useful to the reader and help to minimize the risk of denial by both the abused and the abusive as well as those who work in the domestic violence field.

Ending Domestic Violence: Changing Public Perceptions/Halting the Epidemic

Ethel Klein, Jacquelyn Campbell, Esta Soler, Marissa Ghez, 1997

Witnessing domestic violence strongly affects how people perceive domestic violence and their attitudes about prevention and intervention. The research described in this book addresses the impact that witnessing domestic violence has on people's tolerance of violence and informs the reader about how to advise people to respond when they witness an incident of domestic violence.

Every Lady Deserves a Chance: The Story of the Walter Hoving Home

John Benton, 2001

Walter Hoving Home is a Christian center where women hundreds of young women have come to the facility in New York and California. The Home is a residential rehabilitation program, providing food, shelter, clothing medical care, educational and vocational training as well as spiritual guidance. John Benton does not receive any federal funds but depends on individual gifts and donations to support the Home.

Fatal Families: The Dynamics of Intrafamilial Homicide

Charles Patrick Ewing, 1997

Fatal Families examines the nature, causes, and consequences of family homicide in modern American society. Using a case study approach, Charles Patrick Ewing explores the social, cultural, and psychological forces that lead people to kill members of their own families.

Feminist Perspectives on Wife Abuse

Edited by Kersti Yllo & Michele Bogard, 1988

Feminists seek to understand why men in general use physical force against their partners and what functions this serves for a given society in a specific historical context. When a husband uses violence against his wife, people often view this as a random, irrational act. In contrast, feminists, in this document, define wife abuse as a pattern that becomes understandable only through examination of the social context. Our society is structured along the dimension of gender.

From Violence Toward Love: One Therapist's Journey

Marjorie Holiman, 1997

Marjorie Holiman makes connections between her own experiences and those of others. She does not simply relate her cases: she lets the reader feel what it is like to work with people who are violent and those who have been violated. After setting a context for therapy and for understanding violent situations, Holiman outlines nine therapy tasks to help people change, including attention to safety, responsibility, retribution, and forgiveness.

Fundraising: For the Long Haul

Kim Klein, 2000

Kim Klein has 25 years of experience as a fundraiser, trainer, and author. She provides practical assistance for developing a healthy fundraising program that will be successful the long haul.

Becky Due, 2003

Becky Due details the life of Angie who doesn't want to be a victim anymore. Deep down what she hopes for most is to find a good man to love and to feel safe in this world, but her fears take her down the wrong path. Angie's anger and suffering lead her to fight for change for herself and all women through writing. Angie decides to do a piece on the women working at a local strip club. They discover the realities of the women's lives and encourage them to make healthy changes. But first they decide to get revenge on the men who go to, *The Gentlemen's Club*.

Improving Community Response to Crime Victims: An 8-Step Model for Developing Protocol

Anita B. Boles & John C. Patterson, 1997

The guidance offered in this book by Boles & Patterson is based on years of contact with a wide variety of professionals and communities. They recognize that even small isolated communities have the resources that can be pulled together to improve interagency coordination. Even communities with a tradition of good interdisciplinary cooperation can benefit from the process described in this book and enhance their response to victims, while achieving improved case outcomes.

The Innocent Victims: A Handbook for Parents & Caregivers of Children Exposed to Domestic Violence

Julianne Leavy, 2003

Children are often the forgotten victims of domestic violence. Leavy says that we need to see and hear their pain, *The Innocent Victims* looks at the effect of domestic violence on children and helps adults to understand and respond to their needs.

Mothers on Trial: The Battle for Children and Custody

Phyllis Chesler, 1991

In *Mothers on Trial* Phyllis argues that mothers are routinely punished for having a career or job, for staying home on welfare, or for failing to provide a male role model. When fathers persist, a high percentage wins custody, because judges tend to view the higher male income and the father-dominated family as in the "best interest of the child." Many judges also assume either that the father who fights for custody is rare and should therefore be rewarded for loving his children or that something is wrong with the mother. Our focus must shift from resolving custody by force, and in anti-mother ways, to a more civilized resolution of our child-care arrangements.

Multiple Victimization of Children: Conceptual, Developmental, Research, & Treatment Issues

B.B. Robbie Rossman, PhD & Mindy S. Rosenberg, PhD 1998

This book takes on a large challenge and meets it with success. Rossman and Rosenberg present the work of researchers, clinicians and others on the edge of addressing and understanding the experiences of multiply victimized children.

Naming the Violence

For every lesbian battered in an intimate relationship, for every lesbian who has left her partner because of abuse or who wants to, *Naming the Violence* offers personal stories of pain and empowerment, grief and healing.

No Place to Stay

M. Elizabeth Fuhr, 1996

This book presents to the advocate a format to successfully assist the homeless person from the street to housing. Elizabeth in *No Place to Stay* says that no human being is meant to live on the street, and no person *really wants* to be homeless. "Everyone needs a home."

No Visible Wounds: Identifying Nonphysical Abuse of Women

Mary Susan Miller, PhD, 1995

In *No Visible Wounds*, Mary Susan Miller exposes the pervasive phenomenon of nonphysical battery of women, identifying the ways in which abusive men use emotional, psychological, social, and economic battery to manipulate and control their spouses.

The Physician's Guide to Domestic Violence

Patricia Salber, M.D., & Ellen Taliaferro, M.D., 1995

Abused women and children are patients of doctors and health care workers. Medical professionals treat both physical and mental health issues directly related to the violence in their lives. Many victims are seen repeatedly before the domestic abuse is discovered. In some instances the violence is never identified, and the physician continues to work up a myriad of complaints without making a definitive diagnosis. The health care workers role in recognizing and responding to domestic violence is important because the health care community has unique opportunity for action. The authors recommend this book to physicians and those working in the health care.

Promoting Diversity and Social Justice: Educating People from Privileged Groups

In order to effectively implement diversity and social justice initiatives, it is important to involve people from privileged groups. Recovering from Rape – Second Edition

The Roller Coaster of My Life

Liza Prael, 2004

Liza retraces some of the ups and downs of her interesting and painful life in a way that will be enlightening and inspiring to others who have suffered in their lives. In *The Roller Coaster of My Life*, Liza talks about how she has been abused, and how she has been “dragged up” – instead of brought up – by parents who should have know better. She describes how she has been beaten by husbands and boyfriends. But, no matter how wild the roller coaster ride, she explains how you can make of life what you want to.

Safe Havens for Pets: Guidelines for Programs Sheltering Pets for Women who are Battered

Frank R. Ascione, PhD, 2000

Safe Havens for Pets is one attempt to meet the needs of domestic violence and animal welfare agencies considering the developing pet sheltering programs or evaluating the operation of existing programs.

Safe, not Sorry: Keeping Yourself and Your Family Safe in a Violent Age

Tanya K. Metaksa, 1997

Tanya states that her purpose is to give women a practical and rational means of protecting themselves. This book illustrates situations in which a woman should be aware of the potential for anger and suggest how to deal with it. It will also tell the stories of women who found themselves in danger and had to deal with it and the aftermath, alone. Finally, there are the women who before, during, or after the fact found the strength to take their destiny in their own hands. These are the women who chose to be *Safe, not Sorry*.

When Violence Begins at Home

Dr. Wilson traces the origins of violence against women from its roots in patriarchal society dating back thousands of years to the beginnings of the grassroots battered women's movement in the 1970s. Until then, the existence of domestic violence had been either denied or tacitly approved by law and custom. Since then domestic violence has been defined as a crime and penal codes have been revised. Advocacy and support groups for victims have been formed. Public and private service agencies have developed programs to educate personnel and the community about the dynamics of domestic violence, its effects, and its treatments.

Why Does He Do That?

Lundy Bancroft, 2002

This is a book for women who have faced mistreatment by their partners, and who are concerned about how their children have been affected by the events they have seen or heard. Bancroft describes how children are emotionally hurt by living in the atmosphere that abusive behavior creates, and how mothers can help their children heal.

Amy Lynn, 2000

This book stresses and emphasizes the importance of healthy boundaries. Many women lack self-esteem and self-definition, which are the illusions that prevent women from seeing what really exists in abusive relationships. This book will create a path of wellness from abuse.

When Violence is no Stranger

Kristen J. Leslie, 2002

If you are a pastoral caregiver or other interested professional, this work will inform you of the unique needs of the acquaintance rape survivor, enable you to accompany her in the long task of rebuilding her world, and make a difference in how accessible and how safe you are to her.
